### Mr. Mauro's "End of Year" Reflections

I am amazed that the 2004-2005 school year is coming to an end. I keep thinking that it was only yesterday that I was communicating with students for the first time during the student orientation days, or interacting with staff members for the first time during the staff retreat, or meeting parents for the first time during parent back-to-school night. I am so proud of the spiritual, academic, social, and personal growth that has taken place for the Knights and Lady Knights of SMHS throughout this school year. At this particular time of the year, after recently celebrating the Commencement Ceremony with the Class of 2005, I would like to share how academics have been enhanced at Saint Mary's this year.

Seniors earned the following scholarships: special scholarships – 18, in-state scholarships – 28, out-of-state scholarships – 4, community college scholarships – 4, and athletic letters of intent – 8, leading to a grand total of \$3,683,000 in offered scholarships over four years and \$1,790,000 in accepted scholarships over four years.

Graduates are pursuing their future goals in the following manner: 62% are attending 4-year colleges/universities, 32% are attending 2-year community colleges, and 6% are attending military or vocational programs or are entering the work force.

Thirty-six seniors received special school awards for excellence in academic areas and for outstanding contributions to the vitality of our community in nonacademic realms.

AIA Scholar/Athlete awards, which require a 3.5 semester GPA and a varsity letter, were earned as follows: eight Freshmen, nine Sophomores, twenty-five Juniors, and twenty-one Seniors.

In addition to the success of our students, steps were taken to improve the academic program on campus. SMHS developed a weighted GPA grading scale for implementation in the 2005-2006 school year. Seniors were provided incentives related to their finals if they stayed focused academically during the fourth quarter. AP US History and AP Calculus were offered this year, and next year we will add offerings in AP English for juniors and seniors, AP Spanish, and AP Government. Additionally, SMHS will continue to offer on-site, community college co-enrollment in English (ENG 101-102) and Pre-Calculus (MAT 187).

The staff initiated a focus on increasing “Academic Atmosphere” and “Academic Performance” by participating in curriculum mapping, by reviewing the assessment procedures used with their students, and by using the rubric from Charlotte Danielson's book, Enhancing Professional Practice, to develop their individual goals for the year. The hiring of new staff members with extensive experience or degrees in their content areas was critical in student academic growth this year and will continue to be a point of focus for the future.

For those that believe that academic focus is not a point of emphasis at SMHS, I would share that is not true! As the school year winds to an end, I want to express a sincere “Thank You” for the efforts of so many. I am in awe of the great work that took place this year and I look forward to new growth in the years to come. Have a safe, restful, and blessed summer!

## CLASS OF 2005 COLLEGE CHOICES

The 194 members of the Class of 2005 pursued a wide range of opportunities for “life after Saint Mary’s”. 120 seniors [62%] applied to and were accepted to 72 Colleges and Universities. 62 have enrolled at Arizona State University at Main, East and West campuses; 18 at Northern Arizona University; 14 at the University of Arizona; one at Grand Canyon University, one at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical, and 24 at Colleges and Universities outside of Arizona.

Fifty of our graduates were offered just over 3.5 million dollars in scholarships. This figure includes those students who received multiple scholarships to multiple Universities and Colleges and had to make a choice to receive the scholarships of the school they decided to attend. In light of their final decisions, 36 have accepted just over 1.8 million dollars of these scholarships.

Fifty-eight seniors have enrolled in 9 community colleges. 10 seniors will move to one of 4 technical schools, the military, or other workforce.

## Sentinels of the Dawn

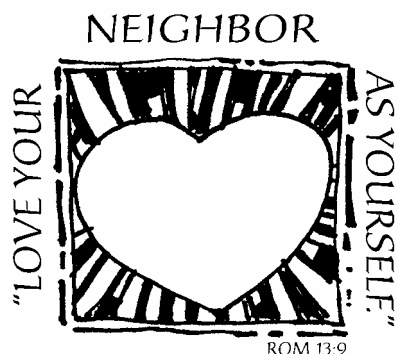

Contemplating the passage from 1 Timothy 4:12, "Let no one look down on you because of your youth, but be a continuing example of love, faith, and purity to believers," our late Pope John Paul II always had a great love and hope for the youth of today. In his document *The Church in America*, he referred to our young people as the Sentinels of the Dawn, the future of our faith and the hope for our world. Many times at World Youth Day, he exhorted those present to be bold and to proclaim the gospel. In one of his messages to youth, he stated:

You are not being sent to proclaim some abstract truth. The gospel is not a theory or an ideology. The gospel is life! How does Jesus send you? He promises neither sword, nor money, nor power, nor any of the things which the means of social communications make attractive to people today. He gives you instead grace and truth. But we human beings have this treasure in earthen vessels (2 Cor 4:7). That is why we are often afraid of the demands of the Redeemer's love...(but) whenever young men and women allow the grace of Christ to work in them and produce new life, the extraordinary power of divine love is released into their lives and into the life of the community. It transforms attitudes and behavior and inevitably attracts others to follow the same adventurous path. This power comes from God and not us.

So as you the students of St. Mary's either graduate or prepare for another academic year, the Parent Spirituality Committee congratulates you and wishes you God's blessings and God's boldness. We encourage you to speak to our culture because you know the truth! Do not be silent in the midst of controversy; instead, speak confidently and proudly always pointing others toward heaven. Remember, your treasure is in everlasting life – be generous and bring others to Him. You have been given the task of watching guard as the first to see the light of the Risen Lord. Truly, be heroic and live your life as the Sentinels of the Dawn.



## Spiritual Day's of Recollection At Saint Mary's: A Plan for Progress

As we complete another year in the long history of Saint Mary's, we want to highlight an important way in which we add to the spiritual growth of our students in conjunction with their academic progress.

The Day of Recollection for each class is designed to strengthen the student's faith, to provide an opportunity for interaction with other members of the class, and to promote age appropriate developmental growth as members of the Christian community. "Youth Arise," an organization whose mission is evangelization through the example of young adults, help us to facilitate the focus topic of the specific Day of Recollection. The day itself is marked by private and communal prayer, celebration of community experienced both in collective and small group interaction, an opportunity for reception of the sacrament of Reconciliation, celebration of the Eucharist, and affirmation by other students, parents and members of the greater community. Ultimately, for all grade levels the purpose is to respond to the invitation of Jesus "to come and see."

Each class-specific Day of Recollection has a special theme that follows a cumulative vision. For freshmen, the Day of Recollection is "Encountering Jesus." The day is designed to promote spiritual self-awareness and reflection and to encourage building a personal relationship with the Risen Lord.

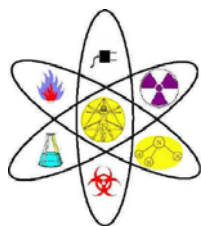
Expanding upon this foundation, the sophomore day of recollection is entitled "Relationships: The Path to Holiness." Students are helped to distinguish between appropriate and inappropriate relationships and to recognize that the Church is comprised of a multiplicity of relationships all of which contribute to building the Body of Christ.

From a personal and relational understanding gained in earlier Days of Recollection, students in the junior Day of Recollection investigate the theme of "Service: A Call to Discipleship." Within this topic, students learn to place their gifts at the service of the Christian community.

Having encountered Jesus, and then recognized the importance of relationship and service, the senior Day of Recollection develops the theme of "Leadership: Stewards of the New Evangelization." The senior retreat occurs near the end of the academic year and is designed to assist students in the transition not only to personal responsibility, but also to the realization that all are called by virtue of their baptism to be witnesses of the great gift of faith. As a rite of sending, the prayer is that the power of the Holy Spirit will anoint these young men and women with the ability to discern truth from falsehood, to distinguish true happiness from the illusions fostered by a seductive culture, and to place themselves in service to the greater community rather than to an individualistic life of self-promotion.

The success of each retreat depends upon the collective prayer of all and is finally a gift of grace.

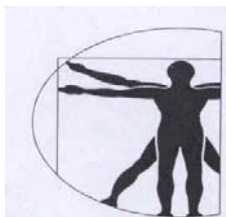

## Advanced Biology Field Trip To Catalina Island Marine Institute

On May 11 -13, students from the Advanced Biology class went to Catalina Island to snorkel, explore marine biology, and hike a desert coastal region. In addition to participation in programs sponsored by the Institute, students enjoyed the opportunity to swim with seals, hike to waterfalls, and watch the sunrise.

"Catalina Island Marine Institute (CIMI) was founded on a basic premise: to provide teachers with an opportunity to bring their students out of traditional learning environments to experience, first hand, marine biology and island ecology by immersing them in experiential activities with an educational focus. The program's success stems from Catalina Island's unique and dynamic setting, a desert island off the coast of California, a commitment to improve programs at all levels, a dedicated and experienced staff, and the dedication and commitment of the schools and group leaders who facilitate the CIMI experience for their students.

The CIMI experience is not only 'educational' but enriching in numerous ways for each student. Many students are experiencing their first trip away from home, first trip on a passenger boat (possibly their first seasickness as well!), first camp experience, first overnight field trip, and more. Combined with the varied and dynamic programs each experiences during the scheduled activities, students will have crossed many hurdles, returning home enriched and energized from a fun and unique trip with their teachers and classmates.

The collective experience of individual students helps to reinforce class work and school curricula, allows teachers and students alike to bridge the gap between ideas and knowledge from the classroom and the dynamic marine and terrestrial world on and adjacent to Catalina Island. Individually, most are exposed to new areas of academic and recreational interest. Living as part of a community, learning to observe the world around us, and to be good stewards of our environment is all part of the CIMI experience."
