Graduation Night Guidelines

The graduation ceremonies should be a pleasant occasion for parents, who are justifiably proud of the achievements of their sons and daughters, often at significant sacrifice. They should also be a gratifying and memorable experience for students, who generally enjoy mixed emotions of joy and sadness, but who treasure the “one time” nature of the events. Finally, graduation is a rewarding and often invigorating experience for teachers and other school personnel who have shared the ups and downs of the development process with so many of these students.

The immediate purpose of the graduation program is to create a fitting setting for presenting evidence of achievement – a Saint Mary’s diploma – to each graduate. Interruptions in the program take away from the dignity of the ceremony and may spoil a family’s “one time” experience. Here are a few guidelines to help assure that the graduation ceremonies will be remembered pleasantly:

1. Spectators are asked to act with restraint during the announcement of the graduates’ names. Hooting, whistling, or calling out to the graduates is very destructive to the spirit of the ceremony. Please show your excitement and joy with applause.

2. A professional photographer has been hired to take a photo of each graduate receiving his or her diploma. You may order these photos. Please do not attempt to come down the aisles to take pictures during the ceremony. Please do not interrupt the processions into and out of the arena attempting to take pictures.

Eligibility for Final Examinations

Parents are reminded that all financial obligations must be met for students to take final examinations and for seniors to participate in graduation ceremonies. The payment deadline is Friday, May 19.

Financial Aid Update

The deadline for applications for scholarships funded by CTODP was April 21, 2006. Applicants filing on or before that date will be eligible for CTODP need-based financial aid. Families who missed the filing deadline should nevertheless file a complete CTODP application as soon as possible. This allows us to receive an evaluation of financial need and may permit us to use non-CTODP funding sources to provide some help to families with need. Financial aid from every source requires proof of financial need.

How to Lose Your CTODP Financial Aid

CTODP will award financial aid only to registered students. In mid-May, CTODP will send to us a list of applicants from Saint Mary’s. Shortly thereafter, we MUST inform CTODP of any applicant who is not registered for the upcoming school year. These unregistered applicants will not receive CTODP funding. Registration packets for returning students were mailed to parents in mid-March. Students wanting to return to Saint Mary’s should reregister as soon as possible.

The decision by Saint Mary's to move to a seven-period school day was a significant change in the academic structure of the school. The WCEA's Accreditation Visiting Team, during its midterm visit to the school, commended the willingness of the faculty to receive and own the school's vision, and especially commended the faculty for the professional manner in which it responded to the challenge of the seven-period school day. The Visiting Team urged the school to maximize the possibilities presented by the move to a seven-period day, including exploration of several scheduling options. Indeed, teachers and staff spent months discussing this issue and explored a number of alternative approaches. In completing the process, teachers voted to recommend a plan in which all seven classes would meet each day. This recommendation was supported by the SMHS Advisory Committee, Principal Mark Mauro, and School Superintendent MaryBeth Mueller. All members of the school community are thankful for the continuing hard work of all those who shaped the discussion and decision on this important issue.

Catholic Community Foundation Service Awards

The Catholic Community Foundation awarded thirteen eighth graders \$8,000 each at an awards ceremony held at the Diocesan Pastoral Center on April 4. Each of the eighth graders will receive \$2,000 per year for four years to be used for tuition at a Catholic high school in the Diocese of Phoenix. The awards were based on service to the school, parish, and community. The students were nominated by a non-family adult who was aware of their service activities. Once nominated, the students had to submit three letters of reference and write an essay on the scripture, 1 Peter 4:10 "As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace." Two of this year's recipients of the award are planning to attend Saint Mary's in the fall: Katie Martinez won the Richard and Eileen Bloechl Award and Kevin Burton won the Phyllis Anderson Award. Saint Mary's High School Summer Course Offerings – 2006

The Saint Mary's Summer School program is conducted in two sessions. Each session represents one semester of study. The tuition fee for each session is \$150. Tuition is due with the summer school registration form. Students will be allocated to a session on a first-come-first-serve basis, with a preference for students required to take the course. When sessions reach their maximum size, enrollment in that session will be closed. Please note: The maximum number of classes a student can take during a session is one. If a student needs or wants to take two courses, they are committed to taking both sessions. Registration forms are available in the Main Office and should be returned to the Business Office by May 12, 2006.

First Session

Monday, June 5, to Friday, June 23

Second Session

Monday, June 26, to Tuesday, July 18

Each session runs from 7:30 to 12:30, Monday through Friday
except for the July 3-4 holiday.

Art 1-2 (drawing, painting, sculpture): Two separate sessions of Art 1-2 are offered. Students may enroll in one or both of the sessions. Session One is not a prerequisite for Session Two. Credit: one-half credit per session. Textbook: No textbook required.

Geometry: This course is available to students who have completed Algebra 1-2 with a grade of C or better and who have not yet taken Geometry; these students must take both semesters of Geometry and will earn one full credit. This summer program should be of particular interest to students who began their mathematics studies as freshmen at the Pre-Algebra level. Taking two semesters of Geometry in summer school will enable these sophomores to meet the entrance requirements of the three Arizona universities, which require a complete year of mathematics beyond Algebra 3-4/Trigonometry. Credit: one-half credit per session. Textbook: Required.

Language Arts: This course is required for some incoming freshmen but open to any incoming freshman who wishes to improve and enhance their language arts (reading/writing) skills. The course is offered during both sessions. Credit: none. Textbook: A \$20 Textbook Rental/Materials Fee is required for this course.

Pre-Algebra: This course is offered as two separate sessions. Students may enroll in only one of the sessions. This course is required for some incoming freshmen but open to any incoming freshman who wishes to improve and enhance basic math skills. Credit: none. Textbook: A \$20 Textbook Rental Fee is required for this course. [Students failing Pre-Algebra this year may take this class for credit to cure the deficiency.]

Study Skills: This course is open to all students but is specifically designed for students who will take honors or AP courses next year. The course provides practical strategies to help students do better in class, study more efficiently, improve grades, set goals, and practice critical academic and lifelong learning skills. This course is only offered during the First Session. Credit: None. Textbook: A \$20 Materials Fee is required for this course.

Social Justice

Pope Benedict in his latest encyclical, Deus Caritas Est (God is Love), states that charity is the primary work of the Church and that justice is the primary work of the state and political system. Charity is a personal action of giving from one's wealth and surplus to meet the needs of another individual. Justice is working with others to bring forth change so that a group of people may be able to meet their own needs through changing the political system. Pope Benedict states that justice is the goal of the state and political system and that the Church and its members need to be involved in the political system, not to replace it, but to bring forth the light of Christ in a dark world. Social Justice then is working with others with a common understanding to bring about change for the "common good".

When confronted with a situation to provide charity and/or participate in social justice, all one needs to do is ask themselves, "What would Jesus do?" We are called by Christ to "be and move in the world" but not to belong to this world. As students of Saint Mary's, it is important to do works of service in charity and to also strive for social change. In the words of Pope Benedict: "there will never be a situation where the charity of each individual Christian is unnecessary, because in addition to justice, man needs, and will always need, love."

Some Sensible Advice On Teenage Parties

The Project Graduation event provides a great alternative to unsafe conduct and unsupervised activities on one night of the year, Graduation Night, that presents special concerns about teen behavior. The success of past Project Graduation events, and the expected success of the upcoming event, surely proves that parents and teens can work cooperatively together to create a meaningful, fun experience on the final night of their high school careers.

The [Arizona Republic](#) recently published some advice to parents on dealing with teenage parties every other day of the year (summer included). We reprint those suggestions in the belief that some simple rules, laid out in advance, can go far toward assuring that teens enjoy their high school years in a safe and sensible fashion, all from www.safegrad.com.

If your son or daughter plans to have a party:

- Plan together for a safe and fun party. Neither you nor your teen wants any unexpected surprises.
- Together, choose where in your house the party will take place.
- Have a definite start and finish time for the party.
- Decide in advance how to clear guests from your house when the party is over.
- Be clear that the parents of any guest under the influence of drugs or alcohol will be notified.
- Decide in advance how unwelcome guests will be handled.
- Admit only those guests on an established guest list.
- Do not allow guests to come and go from your home.
- Include an activity as part of the evening, for example, skating, movies, dancing, bowling, games, etc.
- Make sure that alcohol and medication in your home is not accessible to your guests.
- Discourage the addition of alcohol by providing canned pop or juice rather than a punch bowl.
- Contact the parents of the invited guests to let them know what will be happening at your house.

If your son or daughter plans to go to a party:

- Know where your teen will be (the address, telephone number and name of the party host or where the party is being held).
- Don't hesitate to call the parents of the teen hosting the party.
- Offer assistance, clarify the hours, ensure supervision of the party, make certain alcohol and drugs will not be present. (Let your teen know you are doing this beforehand.)
- Make sure your teen has a ride with a designated driver. Be a backup if need be. Be clear that your teen can call on you (or name someone else) for a ride home.
- Let your teens know it is OK to call home for a ride under any circumstances, especially if they have had any alcohol.
- Set a curfew. If you are awake or if you ask your teen to wake you when he or she gets home, take the time to talk about the party and show that you care.
- If your teen stays overnight with a friend, it is not unreasonable for you to check with the parents. Check on the fact that they will be home, that you agree on the curfew hours and any other basic rules that should apply.
